HISTORY IN REVIEW

- Work on the building began on June 25, 1890 and open in 1891.
- St. Mary's was established as an elementary school and a high school academy.
- ♦ In 1894, a class of four graduated from St. Mary's Academy.
- ♦ In the mid-1890s the school closed and the building was rented to Professor Beeman who ran a successful business college.
- ♦ In 1897, the building was rented to the New Richmond Public Schools for \$200 for the school year. They were to pay \$240 for subsequent years.
- ♦ The school survived the cyclone of 1899.
- St. Mary's was reopened as a parochial school in 1906.
- ◆ The school again was rented to the public school from 1920 1926.
- In 1953 ground was broken for the new school. First and second grade classes were in the church basement and the rest of the classes convened in the old Knights of Columbus Hall.
- The new school opened in 1954 and the school was remodeled and an addition was added in 2003.

I Remember By Fr. Jim Brinkman



It was back in the early 1950's that I entered St. Mary School and began my adventure in 1st grade. It was a whole new world meeting new friends and learning together. However, by 4th grade it was obvious that I was having problems keeping up and that I had some type of reading disability. Today they have ways of testing and diagnosis with fancy names to help students, but not in my day. Sister Patricia recognized the problem and worked with me after school each day for several months. I felt very proud that she would take the time for me. Then the miracle happened, I began to read sentences and a whole new world opened up to me. I remember the very first book I read: "The Adventures of Kit Carson" and reading became fun.

I told Sister Patricia that I wanted to be just like her when I grew up and she smiled and thanked me for the compliment. To her surprise, I told her that I wanted to be just like her and be a sister. She then tried gently to explain that boys can't be sisters. I was heartbroken and it wasn't until I was in college that I discovered they do have boy sisters called brothers. After I finished school I joined the Holy Cross Brothers at Notre Dame to be a teaching brother, like Sister Patricia. Sometime later, the Lord took me in a different direction to the seminary. I never realized how much influence Sister Patricia, the priests who served at the school and the school itself have made on me in my vocation today.

Sister Patricia and I remained good friends and have kept in touch throughout the years until her death about a year ago. Every time I go to the school for my weekly visits to teach, I remember her and how she has touched me by her love and kindness. Teachers have a way of doing that to students and it really shows in a faith based environment where spirituality blossoms in the spirit of Jesus.

Alumni Recipe Who makes this famous tea ring?

2 c. lukewarm milk, scalded, cooled 1/2 c. sugar 2 tsp. salt 2 Tbsp. granular yeast 1/2 c. melted butter 2 eggs, beaten 7-8 c. flour

Butter Cinnamon Brown Sugar Powdered Sugar



Mardi Gras Queen 2013

Mix together milk, sugar and salt. Sprinkle in yeast into lukewarm water. Let set 10 minutes. Add to milk mixture. Stir in melted butter and egg. Stir in part of the flour until it becomes too stiff to stir with a spoon. Turn out onto board; gradually add rest of flour. Knead until elastic. Let rise (about 2 1/2 hours). Poke down. Let rise again. Divide into 2-3 parts. Roll dough out onto a board 8X18 inches. Coat with butter, brown sugar and cinnamon. Roll up. Place in pan in a circle. Cut and arrange. Bake at 375 degrees for 18-22 minutes. Glaze with powdered sugar icing and garnish with maraschino cherries.
